### New Members Q&A

### How Do Most Members Mount Their Perfins?

In recent memory, the membership has not been polled to determine how most members collect/ mount their perfins. It is safe to say that many use the catalog/album to various degrees. Inherent in the hobby is that there is no best/worst, right/wrong or good/bad way to collect and/or mount stamps. The answer as to why collectors mount stamps the way they do is to learn why they decided to collect perfins, and, as they accumulated them, how they decided to display them so that they might review their degree of success toward their collecting objective and possibly share it with others.

The members who use the catalog/album to mount their stamps are split into two basic groups: 1) stamp face up, or 2) face down. The face down "mounters" want to clearly show the perfin pattern, hopefully well centered in the stamp with no holes missing and the stamps are often found mounted in clear Showgard type mounts. The face up "mounters" usually have a tangential interest in particular stamp issues such as the 1902-08 series, Two Cent reds, Apple Greens, Black Hardings, etc. and take pride in displaying them. In addition, the crossover collectors of perfinned precancels find it of much more interest to show the precancel on the face side, rather than the perfin punch from the back.

The collectors who do not mount the stamp in the catalog/album often indicate that they want to use the catalog as a reference to check future acquisitions. If there is a stamp covering the

referenced pattern, whether by hinge or in a mount, it is not easy to place a different stamp over the reference pattern. Some collectors use Vario or Hagner type pages to display perfins. Others use clear stock pages so that stamps can be seen from the front or back and frequently will put plain black paper pages between the stock sheets in order to make the perfin pattern clearly visible from either viewing position.

Please remember, as has been stated previously in this column, if one is going to use a catalog/album to mount their stamps, new members are encouraged to obtain a copy of the latest edition (1998) along with Additions and Corrections Pages Nos. 1 and 2. That combination of publications will provide the most comprehensive references for collecting and mounting perfins.

To further delineate the numerous stamp mounting possibilities, Perfins Club members with more collecting experience are encouraged to provide a description of different/interesting methods of mounting perfins with an explanation of how and why they devised such a method.

# 2009 World Census Results

Bob Schwerdt (#505-L)

A major disappointment was that only 17 members responded - - about 3% of the membership. In the previous censuses - - 1993 and 1997 - - about 50 and 100 collectors, respectively, reported their totals. In the 1993 census, separate categories were arranged for reporting perfins: postal's, revenues, stationery, and officials. In 1997 there was no such division, so collectors had an easier task of counting everything.

Perhaps this 2009 census was too restrictive in requiring a count of only commercial perfins? Or perhaps collectors had acquired so many perfins that counting became too time consuming, especially if they had arranged their material into various topical areas; for example, the British perfins by monarchs, the U.S. perfins by 1902's, prepers, synoptic, etc.

Another disappointment was my fault for not adequately suggesting in more detail which count was wanted, i.e., the Colombian SCADTA and the Deutsches Reich overprints on Bavaria. clarification. Scott numbers and additional descriptions have been added in many places to this final report. There are a total of 46 blank spaces - no tallies - - a number which might have been reduced had more collectors participated. Nevertheless, many of the no tally areas represent scarce items or non-commercial perfin types since I arbitrarily added country names because revenue perfins existed from those places, and I believed that commercial perfins might also be found.

A rewarding feature was that several collectors added country names that were not listed on the original census form. These areas have been inserted into the final report, thus adding 24 to the original country and affiliates census list.

Thanks to all who participated: Paul Mistretta (LM#111), former *Bulletin* editor, who made the list of the original catalog perfin count and organized the census form; the members who participated and made valuable suggestions; and our present *Bulletin* editor, Ken Masters (#3589), who had the task of planning and arranging this final report.

In many places the collector tally equals the catalog perfin count or exceeds the count in several places. A collector count which exceeds the catalog count

may be significant for the foreign catalog editor to investigate for possible new patterns.

A "- S" in the Your Count column means that several collectors had the same totals.

In addition to the census forms, I have included three supplemental charts presenting some additional analysis of the results which you may find interesting.

I hope that this report will be useful to the membership now that country perfin possibilities and collector totals are known. Undoubtedly, this report has some mistakes. Please report any errors to me rather than to our editor. Ken already has plenty to do. I can write a follow-up article if you direct your responses to me at 9 Memory Lane, Poughkeepsie, NY 12603-5231.

# U.S. Pattern P110.6 - New Postmark

Dan Baugher (#3825)

As a beginner perfin collector on a budget, I am always looking in the dealers' cover boxes for a deal. As most of you already know, most dealers only have a few perfin covers and they are usually hidden, way in the back of the box.

I found the cover below at one of the bigger stamp shows in the St. Louis area in St. Charles (a suburb of St. Louis). It is a pre-printed cover that was air mailed from the Phoenix Insurance Company of Hartford, CT to the Commerce Trust Company of Kansas City, Missouri . Both the 2-cent (SC #707) and 50-cent (SC #570) stamps are perforated with pattern P110.6.

The Phoenix Insurance Company has 2 patterns, one is P110.5 from Hartford CT that was used from 1902 to 1914. The second is P110.6 from Cincinnati OH that was used from 1908 to 1938. The cover that I found is from Hartford, CT, but it is clearly a P110.6 because it has the "I" dotted, where P110.5 does not. The cover was cancelled at Hartford, CT and the corner of the cover is from Hartford, CT. The postmark is February 19, 1934 which fits the P110.6 usage. Unfortunately, the cover is without the back sheet, so I cannot confirm the Kansas City receipt.


Since the corner card does not match the primary user for P110.6, I sent a scan of my find to Brad

Baker (LM#3766), the U.S. Catalog Chairman. Brad confirmed that this is a new, previously unreported secondary postmark for pattern P110.6. It will be listed as such in the next issue of the Corrections and Additions to the Catalog of United States Perfins.

I looked on the internet for the Phoenix Insurance Company and found that it's corporate headquarters have been in Hartford CT since 1851. It had branch offices throughout the country and there was a branch office in Cincinnati. The Commerce Trust Company was a major bank in Kansas City at the time and it still exists today.

A few questions from this novice are: why would an insurance company in Hartford, CT have a preprinted air mail cover to a bank in Kansas City? I don't think it would be cash, but I guess it could be checks for premiums. Aren't their banks in Hartford that they could use? Also, why would a company perforate stamps in one location and send them to the another location? Could the current catalog location of Cincinnati be the unique one, and Hartford be the primary location for this pattern?

Either way, this collector's day was made by adding a listing in the Supplemental Pages to the catalog of the most interesting way to collect stamps (perfins)!!



# The Perfins of Uruguay

In the January/February 2009 issue of *The Perfins Bulletin* (63:5-6), I briefly discussed my work in updating the America's portion of the *World Perfin Catalog* and presented the results of my research on the perfins of Venezuela.

This time I touch upon the perfins of Uruguay. This is another area where the lines get very fuzzy as to what to call the various perfins. The "A" prefix's are for perfins which were used on regular postage

stamps. The "B"s are for perfins which have been punched through both the stamps and the paper to which they are affixed. "P"s are true punches that were used on Uruguay official stamps before they were affixed to mail.

We know the users of four of the "A" perfins along with the approximate dates of usage of all of the "A"s as shown in the following table.



Pattern A1 was used on advertising collars. The story goes that these were sold to customers for half of the face value of the stamp, so that the advertising could seen by mail recipients. The collars have been seen with stamps of the 1932-33 issue as 1c, 3c, 7c, 15c, & 36c. The collars have six advertisers around the stamps, and come in a variety of combinations. They are difficult to find and quite colorful.


Most, if not all, of the "B" punches are revenues. They are probably banks, as the perfins are mostly found on cheques or bills of lading. The year ranges

are from 1910 to 1960. There are a number of numeral punches and dated punches that also occur.


I have seen patterns B10 (B.T.U.) and B11 (CPL), but I do not have a copy for reference. Patterns B26 (INUTILIZADO with 7 mm tall letters and 5 pins) and B27 (ANULADO with 9 mm tall letters) are large multi-stamp cancelling punches that have been reported to me, but I have not seen them. Thus, no illustrations of these four punches are shown on the following pages.





seven star-shaped holes.



Obviously this is not a PERFIN as we usually understand it, a security

device, but I thought it

might interesting to our members. [Editor's Note: This new stamp has certainly on my want list of "unusual items".]

# Canada #249 Questions and Answers (maybe)

A couple of months ago a question was asked in one of the stamp magazines about the hidden dates on early Canadian stamps. The correspondent wanted to know when these started and mentioned that he/ she had identified one in the late 1950's. My first impression was that this was a trivial sort of question (even I can go back to 1942). However, I almost immediately realized that this was one of those instances where no question is stupid or trivial, except those questions which never get asked. If this statement is more or less accepted, then is it possible to accept its reverse - every question that has been posed deserves an answer. I have always thought that the magazines and other journals produced for philatelists should have large question and answer sections in them.


I started my philatelic activities collecting ship stamps, a nice safe broad topical pursuit! This soon became too big, so I chopped it down in size by going to only Canadian ships; "every ship in the Unitrade catalogue and a few extra for good measure" (sailors, lighthouses, wrecks, etc.). This project also started to become much too big, so I chopped some more and took it down to one stamp -Scott or Unitrade Canada #249, the one cent war issue; again anything and everything to do with #249. Since the Canadian postal rates increased just after the war stamps were issued, it is possible to


find blocks of 4 and plate blocks, both mint, used and on cover. There are two types of coils; three types of booklets, etc., etc. So there is a lot of material available. And of course there are PERFINS!

For the purposes of my project there are two types of perfins; first the official OHMS types, O8 and O9, and second all of the private perfins. It would be very difficult to proceed without a copy of Conrad Tremblay's (#1786) checklist<sup>1</sup>, which has given me all of the perfins that exist on Canada #249. (It would be very useful if this checklist was included as one of the appendices in the Johnson and Thomasson catalogue<sup>2</sup> when it is reprinted.)

It appears that I'm searching for about 260 stamps of which I have nearly 200. There are also 6 perfinned precancels (or are they precancelled perfins?), an undetermined number of RPO's (Railway Post Office), and maybe some illegally used MPO's (Mobile Post Office) as well. The perfinned precancels are quite interesting because one of the firms involved purchased only precancelled stamps to perforate - there are no examples of plain perfinned stamps, only perfinned precancels. This is the J.B. Ford Sales Co. perfin on a Windsor Moon #4940 precancel.














Canadian Northern Railways on Toronto Precancel

# Canada #249 (cont.)

The official perfins exist with the earlier 5-holes in the "M" and "H" (O8) perforated insignia and the more recent 4-hole (O9) varieties. Two different plates produced the 4-hole perfins. Although the plates were meant to be identical there are differences which are fairly easily distinguished.

The Wrigley 10th edition makes no mention of the O8 and O9 plates. He catalogues our positions 2 and 4 for ten cents apiece and then lists 4 other positions

on #249 for prices up to \$40.00. The Tremblay checklist has positions 1, 3 and 7 listed. Does anybody have any of these varieties? I would appreciate a photocopy of them and/or the opportunity to purchase or trade. My contact information is at the end of this article.


The Wrigley Catalogue lists three examples of pairings of a #249 perfin and a blank - I have one of them as shown below.






I also have one situation in which a perforated sheet went back through the perforator in a different orientation and another similar perfin where the plate was misaligned with the stamps.










Government employees seemed to be relatively careful in the way in which they pushed stamps through the perforator. Possibly the use of a 10 position perforator plate simplified the feeding-in process and there are, as mentioned, very few positional varieties associated with O8 and O9. One of the interesting features of the private perfins is the fact that they exist with lots of different positions.

What was going on in the mind of the mailroom staff when they ended up producing all 8 positions, as happens in the case of the Canadian General Electric Company shown below? It certainly feels as if this was done on purpose! I only have one example of this in my #249 perfins, but according to the Tremblay checklist, 7 positions occur with 4 different perfins!



The next page shows a neat piece that appeared recently. It is a full strip of ten of the O9 perforator. If anybody has ever thought of doing some plating, then this becomes invaluable.

I have posed several questions that may seem trivial, however they are asked because I don't know the answers!

I am always on the lookout for #249 material and have some material for trade as well as sale. One of my less successful ventures was to pick up some early European perfins in the hope of being able to trade for #249. I still own a lot of unwanted European perfins! I do wish that somebody would take them off my hands. There are about seven hundred of them so I'll trade ten of mine for one of the #249's that I am missing. ### Canada #249 (cont.)

At right is the strip of 10 from the O9 perforator, reduced to 88% of the actual size to fit the page.

The sheet of stamps was fed through the perforator from the left hand side with the image upright.

This multiple, from the second perforator, shows clearly the symmetry of the "O" and the "S". However, there are minute variations in the positioning of the pins in the left hand vertical of the "M" which identifies the row occupied by a stamp in a sheet.

The strip shows that the selvedge was removed and the bottom looks like field stock. It also shows that as the sheet was fed into the perforator, the image came out in position 2 or 4.

An interesting side note is that the second perforator plate was also used to perforate all 14 different stamps in the wartime issue. The large size, high-value stamps of the issue each received 2 impressions from the perforator, nearly always in the correct configuration.

### My Favorite Perfins – Part IV

I began a discussion of favorite and most unusual U.S. perfins in the September/October 2008 *Bulletin*, (62:158-160) with a promise of more to come. In this issue, I present the part of the display presented at the St. Louis convention related to Scott #505, the five-cent error issue.

The Scott #505 five-cent error was produced when a five-cent design stamp was mistakenly included in the middle of a two-cent stamp design plate. Due to their visual similarity and the large number of two-cent stamps with perfins, there may be more of these five-cent error stamps with perfins in existence. Check your collections!

Shown here are two examples of perfins on the fivecent error stamp. The first is a used single, the second is an error pair in a mint block of 12.

I would enjoy hearing from anyone regarding perfins that they own on these five-cent error stamps. All comments are most welcome. My contact information is on page 46 of this *Bulletin*.


### **Five Cent Error Issues**

There are many varieties of the early 1900 Washington-Franklin head issues, but perhaps none more intriguing than the 5 cent errors. Both errors occurred when the 5 cent stamp was mistakenly included within the pane of the 2 cent issue. No perfins are known to exist on the first error, Scott 467. Below is one of two known perfins on the 5 cent carmine error on Scott 505.

# Times Have Changed – But Not That Much

Recently, I was wandering about the internet using my search engine when I suddenly noted the name "Misegades" among the secondary hits. Recognizing that Keith Misegades was one of the earliest editors of The Perfins Bulletin as well as one of our first Presidents, I clicked on that response. Well, this "Misegades" turned out to be the author of an article entitled, Today, Sub-Primes, Tomorrow College Loans.

However, that result got me to try searching for "Keith Misegades". This provided several interesting results, including a link to the Club's website (www.perfins.org) to full copies of The Perfins Bulletin for March 21, 1952 through December 1953.

I found the following quote from the August 21, 1952 Perfins Bulletin particularly interesting:

"How much are perfins worth? Common U.S. and foreign perfins are not worth more than 5 cents to 10 cents per hundred. Perfins on rarer stamps should bring less than one quarter catalog. On paper mixtures may be purchased from between \$1.00 and \$2.00 per pound. Perfin covers are worth perhaps 5 cents to 10 cents apiece. And, of course everything really depends on the stamps concerned and how much each party is willing to give."

Since I have recently been involved in some eBay selling, I tried to reconcile some of the changes between the early 50's and today. A sample of a few recent eBay auctions are:

- \$1.99 for a "perfin pair";
- \$9.99 for a lot of 670 U.S. perfins:
- \$5.00 for a perfin on a C1;
- 49 cents for 7 different perfins;
- 99 cents for a "page of many unchecked U.S. perfins" (about 60 stamps);

- \$3.75 for a perfin on a \$5.00 Scott Catalog #524;
- two separate lots of 500 perfins starting at 99 cents each.

Now, I understand that some of these lots, especially the ones with a 49 cent or 99 cent starting bid, will go higher; some of the asking prices are based on the catalog value of the stamp; some of the lots will go unsold; and that there are shipping charges. However, don't forget, these are selling prices that someone is willing to accept.

If we total the starting bid and the numbers of stamps and then divide the total of starting bids by the number of stamps, we arrive at the average perfin price. To be more reasonable, let's ignore those eBay lots where the minimum bid has apparently been dictated by the stamp's catalog value. And to be even more reasonable, let's add the shipping cost. The result is 1.90017 cents or more conveniently 2 cents per perfin.

How does this compare to 1952? Based on U.S. Department of Labor Consumer Price Index statistics. 10 cents per hundred in 1952 equals 82 cents per hundred or about 1 cent each in 2008 dollars. So, in essence, we might say that in 57 years the selling price of common perfins has essentially doubled.

Remember that lot of 670 with a starting bid of \$9.99? It had nine bids to \$34.33 with \$2.58 shipping for a total of \$36.91 or about 5 cents a perfin.

So can we say that common perfins are worth 2-5 cents each today? A real analysis would require a much larger sample size and a lot less conjecture. But the answer is: Probably so.

### Make Mine Granite

### (or Take with a Dash of Hope)



Among my many (50+) early Swiss perfins in the sitting Helvetia stamp design is the frequently seen small "GB" type used by Gerbruder Benziger of Einsiedeln during the 1879-1898 decades. This type is Number G11 in the 1998 Martin Baer Switzerland catalog: CH PERFINS.

Scott numbers these early Helvetias from #52-59 on white wove paper and #60-68 on granite paper. The granite paper issues contain small fragments of red and blue silk threads and have a considerably higher catalog value used rather than unused. The granite paper also has a higher catalog value than the white wove paper issues.

Naturally, I carefully examined all my copies for the red and blue evidence of the granite variety, but found only one - shown here alongside a different issue with a completely punched perfin.





Mine is a poor copy with face scrape at left edge and minus a few perimeter perforations because of a partial double strike of the perfin pattern. The postmark is an Einsiedeln cds (circular date stamp), dated 29 V 82, but the bottom of the cancel is off the stamp. My copy is the 40 rappen gray issue, Scott

#66. This stamp without the perfin now catalogs \$3,400 in used condition – almost double in value since the 1996 catalog estimate. Unused, it is valued at \$1.80! The stamp must be scarce in used condition to deserve such a high catalog value. The perfin, on the other hand, is common with a rarity factor of 5, halfway between 1 (abundant) and 10 (never seen). I wonder if this is the highest Scott valued stamp with a perfin?

Normally, we consider CTO (canceled to order) stamps as lowering the value of both mint stamps and those used copies that went through the mails. Scott's note after Switzerland #68 indicates that forged and backdated postmarks are evident on all of the granite paper varieties of 1881. So, here we may have an example of stamps canceled to increase their value!

As I examine my fifty plus copies of white paper sitting Helvetias with "GB" perfins, I find that most have similar position postmarks with the town name prominently displayed, almost socked on the nose! I wonder if someone had access to a cancel device and decided to augment his income by backdating a great many unused copies to sell at a profit? Is it possible that all of those mint copies had the "GB" perfin before the stamps were postmarked? Perhaps someone with more information knows the real story of these early Swiss issues? 
# Some Interesting Double Punches

### INTERESTING PERFIN PATTERN - MOROCCO AGENCIES

Bob Szymanski (LM#155)

Every once in awhile a perfin comes along that just seems a little strange. While sorting out some of my perfins from "smaller countries", I noticed this one (see illustrations) tucked in with some Tangier material. After looking at it for some time, I saw that the stamp was a Gibraltar issue (a British Colony) and the pattern, clearly a French perfin (Comptoir National D'Escompte) and the cancel from Tangier. Now, I knew that Tangier was an international city but this perfin looked to be the proof in just one perfin stamp!

I checked the new French Colonies and Offices Perfin Catalog, "Timbres Perforés Pays D'Expression Française & Alsace Lorraine" published by ANCOPER, the French Perfin

Society. [This catalog was reviewed in the February 2008 issue of *The Perfins Bulletin* (62:26).]

This perfin is found on page 53 of this catalog, listed as pattern C.N.11 with a usage of 1907-1908. (The date cancel on this stamp is January 8, 190(6). The catalog includes a note that the colonial stamps of Germany, England and Spain are found with perfins, BUT only B.E.M. is mentioned, not C.N.?

I also looked in Bob Schwerdt's "World Perfin Catalog - Africa". On page 3, Bob lists a C.N. pattern under British Offices in Morocco with Spanish currency. Careful examination shows this stamp is a 5 centimos. Interestingly, this perfin is also listed in the same catalog on page 32 under Morocco with a note that this perfin is found on French Offices in Morocco before the Protectorate was instituted and on page 42 under Spanish Offices in Morocco.



Without the help of these two catalogs, it would be difficult, at best, to ascertain what this perfin actually is. Where else can you find a perfin on an overprinted British colonial stamp with valuation in Spanish, the

cancellation in English and the perfin from a French Bank? This is a great example of why perfin collecting can bring both real dilemmas and great joy!

[Editor's note: Doug Turner (#2549) mentioned that he has a Gibraltar issue 10 Centimos (overprinted Morocco Agencies) with a C.N. perfin, but lacking the Tangier cancel. Also, see Lot 60 in Club Auction #113, page 69 of this *Bulletin*.]
