New Members Q&A

Which Side Of The Stamp Has More Important Information For The Collector Of Perfins?

There seems to be reasonable agreement that to a general perfin collector, the pattern of the punch is the largest single factor in determining the value of a U.S. perfinned postage stamp; and that the pattern is usually best identified from the back of the stamp. However, to the specialty collector the face of the stamp is also of significant importance. In particular, the issue collector identifies her/his prey by searching through stamps that are face up.

One should note that in auction listings of perfinned stamps, the pattern, pattern rating and the issue (usually by Scott catalog number) define individual stamps. The issue collector of "Apple Greens" scans the auction listings for Scott No. 513, the "Black Harding" collector for Scott Nos. 610, 611 and 612 and the "Kans. and Nebr. Overprint" collector for Scott Nos. 657-679.

Novice collectors of perfinned stamps should understand that catalog values or rarity ratings for perfinned stamps are for a particular issuing authority and a specific class of stamps. For example, a rating shown for a pattern in the *Catalog*

of United States Perfins is not applicable to U. S. Revenue Stamps that might be found with that same pattern. Similarly, if one is a collector of Canadian Postage stamps and is considering purchasing a collection, checking the face of each stamp is important. On rare occasions, Canadian stamps were punched with a U.S. pattern and consequently could have a high value rating in the Canadian Catalog, but in the U. S. Postage Catalog it could have a low value rating.

To reiterate, Revenue stamps do <u>not</u> belong in a U. S. postage stamp collection and stamps from other countries do <u>not</u> belong in a single country collection other than their own. The only way a collector can make that determination is to inspect BOTH sides of the stamp.

Because Joe was not going to be able to attend the Convention and receive his award in person, Bob visited him for lunch a few weeks ago and presented him his award at that time. Joe was very nearly overwhelmed and shared his joy with everyone else in the restaurant.

Joe is a long time philatelist having started before WWII when he was involved with the Boy Scouts. He has been a member of the Precancel Society since the mid-1940's and was one of it's most active dealers until he sold all his material to Phil Cayford. At that time he became totally immersed in perfin collecting and still is until this day even

though he sold a great part of his collection to Dave Begin (#3659) due do health reasons. Having switched doctors and feeling much better he has again become active in collecting perfins.

Joe's contribution to perfin collecting began by contacting many collectors in Eastern Europe during the time the Iron Curtain was being pulled down with the wane of Communism. As a result he was able to acquire thousands of perfins on a weekly basis. He was studious in his pursuits, acquiring all of the perfin catalogs and finding many additions for various countries. With the dissemination of this information, hundreds of new patterns were added to the various perfin catalogs. In his discovery of new material, Joe has been and is without peer in perfin circles."

America Aids French Orphans and The User for Pattern N₁₇ is Identified

In my search for perfins I have managed to come across many unspectacular philatelic items. I thought that this was another one of them. Shown below (Figure 1) is an unused return envelope with a 3 cent Washington from the period from November 2, 1917 through June 30, 1919 when the WWI War Emergency rate was in effect. But who wants unused covers with no postal markings? What can these possibly tell us?






Figure 2 Stamp cropped from cover (135% of actual size for clarity)

In checking the Catalog of United States Perfins, the perfin is clearly pattern N17 (NA/FH), a C+ rated perfin (Figure 2). It is not identified as to the user either in the catalog or in the two Additions and Corrections that have appeared to date. The cover is addressed to Lee, Higginson & Co. as the depository for the French Heroes Lafavette Memorial Fund, Inc.

Using the lamp in my stamp room, I noted that, although the cover is sealed, there is an enclosure inside from the "National Association of French

Heroes". Dated 1919, it is a blank receipt to be sent with any donated funds, a request for future donations and the income tax deduction rules. Yes, even back then there was a Federal Income Tax!

Here is a match of perfin pattern N17 to the "National Association of French Heroes". Brad Baker, U.S. Catalog Chairman, concurs and advises that this identification will be listed in the future Additions & Corrections #3.

Doing a little further research reveals information that the Fund was founded in 1917 to help renovate the Marquis de Lafayette's home in southern France for the benefit of French War Orphans. Lee, Higginson & Son Co. (at various locations) was the depository for all monies donated to this Fund. This cover happened to be to the Boston office. The Fund was dissolved in 1922. Interestingly, one of the founders was a fellow named Teddy Roosevelt.

More Modern Woodmen of America

In the June 2007 issue of *The Perfins Bulletin* (61:131-132), copies of a couple of interesting Modern Woodmen of America, Rock Island, IL, post cards from my perfin collection are shown. These cards, prepared for C. W. Hawes, Head Clerk, are franked with 1-cent stamps perfinned with pattern W125 (W/MA).

In this article we have two more Modern Woodmen of America post cards that show usage of pattern W125. (See Figures 1-4). Both of these cards are an "Official Receipt" for a "Benefit Assessment" and are signed by C. W. Hawes.

The note under the signature says "This series of 14 Head Office Views can be obtained for 20 cents. Supply Department, M. W. of A., Rock Island, Ill." So, it would appear a nice collection of Modern

Woodmen of America post cards could be accumulated with enough searching and effort. Who knows, a person might even find one using the very desirable "A" rated pattern, W125A.

The editor advises that a search of the Internet (www.answers.com and other web sites) reveals that the Modern Woodmen, a fraternal benefit society, was formed by Joseph Cullen Root in Lyons, Iowa on January 5, 1883. Its mission was to help families survive after the loss of a breadwinner.

The name Modern Woodmen alluded to the foresters who cleared the land to build their communities, an image Root culled from a sermon by a local preacher. A patriotic reference was added later, and the group became Modern Woodmen of America (MWA).




Figure 2: Address side of Publication Building card




Figure 4: Address side of Office of Supreme Organizer card

More Modern Woodmen of America (cont.)

MWA relocated to Illinois after being incorporated in that state on May 5, 1884. In 1888 its head office was moved to Rock Island, IL where it remains.

After a heated dispute with MWA Head Physician, P.L. McKinnie, Root left MWA and formed the Woodmen of the World Life Insurance Society in Omaha, NE in 1890. [Editor's note: I assume this is the same Woodman of America, the verified user of pattern W147 (WO/W), and their insurance company, Woodmen of the World Life Insurance Society, Omaha, NE, pattern W147.5 (WO/W).]

Today, the Modern Woodmen of America is a leading fraternal life insurance society in the United States, with more than 750,000 members and assets of more than \$6 billion.

In addition to providing insurance and financial services, MWA maintains nearly 2,200 local chapters, or "camps", and 700 youth service clubs. The group provides an array of free community benefits, such as youth educational programs on topics such as bicycle safety, scholarship programs, and a national speech contest.

British Bechuanaland

Now here is a stamp issuing entity that does not come up very often in any discussion of perfins excepting, maybe, "there aren't any known from there!" Well, maybe and maybe not....

For most of us it might be important to know a little history of the area using the name "British Bechuanaland" that should not be confused with "Bechuanaland Protectorate". British Bechuanaland was a British Crown Colony in the south of Africa. It was annexed to the Cape of Good Hope Colony in 1895, thus becoming part of the Union of South Africa. Stamps were issued for this Crown Colony from 1886 to 1897.

Due north of British Bechuanaland, east of German South West Africa and west of Southern Rhodesia was the Bechuanaland Protectorate. This "Bechuanaland" remains intact today. However, since its independence in 1966, it became the Republic of Botswana.

Pictured is a British Bechuanaland Scott #10 which has a black overprint on a Great Britain #111 issued in 1887. The World Perfins Catalog - Africa by Bob Schwerdt (#150-L) does not show any listings for British Bechuanaland. However, two other patterns are shown for



Bechuanaland Protectorate with notes that these are probable fakes. There is no further detail given. Likewise, this "S" pattern appears neither with the Cape of Good Hope nor the South Africa patterns in the same catalog.

The British "Tomkins Perfin Catalog" lists this pattern in a Great Britain stamp as \$0010.37. The catalog lists the city of use as Darlington and the period of use c.1890-1895. So, could there be a company tie? ...a favor of some sort? ...a stamp meant for use in British Bechuanaland but somehow used in Great Britain? ...a fake overprint? ...a new pattern from a new stamp issuing entity? ...gold or fool's gold?

I conferred with our members Bob Schwerdt and Alan Sandy (LM#2539) on this item. Unfortunately, there is no discernable cancel to help. Alan pointed out that Zululand perfins are known with cancels in unlikely places like Liverpool! Alan perused a resource he has - Robson Lowe's *The Empire in Africa*. Alan remarked that at least the perfin is in the one and only correct QV Jubilee listed as overprinted! It could be good, real good, but maybe not!

Here is where we now turn to you our members for any additional light that you might be able to shine on this dilemma. HELP!

Fraudulent Levant Perfins?

In the recently published, excellent catalog: *Perfins of the Ottoman Empire, Turkey, Crete, and Foreign Post Offices in the Levant* by Dick Scheper, I noticed the listing for two items - - the CL perfin (CL 19a) in two British large 2/6 shillings Victorias overprinted 12 PIASTRES. Scheper illustrates them with London postmarks. Why would Levant stamps have London postmarks?

I have some fraudulently (?) overprinted items and have knowledge of others all found on British stamps. Eight of these items are shown below plus the Scheper catalog CL. (I am aware of an additional one, pattern C.B/B, but I do not have a photocopy or picture of it to show you.)

In the illustrations below, front and rear illustrations are those of my copies. Front illustrations only are from photocopies. Sorry, I cannot supply British catalog numbers.

To my knowledge, the fraudulent (?) overprints have appeared only on British stamps with perfins uncharacteristic of those found in other Levant issues. You will note major variations in the overprints shown here.

To organize my album page for these misfits, I would like to know of other examples. If sufficient additional copies are reported, a new listing will be published in the *Bulletin*. It seems there are as many fraudulent items, or more, as there are legitimate ones from British Levant!

The Perfin That Never Was [or Caveat Emptor]

Once upon a time I had a desire to have a Perfin machine that would produce my own Perfin to be used on all my mail. Eventually, I located a company who would make such a machine, designed my intended Perfin and successfully raided the piggy bank to finance the purchase of this machine.

The maximum die area was 1" x 3/4" (25.1 mm x 19.1 mm), but obviously it would have to be smaller than that. With a limited choice of initials, i.e, C, CC, CJTC, I decided on



CC and by overlapping the two initials, produced a design as shown to the right.

Previously, in 1995, I had arranged for John Lyding (LM#116) of The Perfins Club to be supplied with an Anchor Perfin (U.S. pattern Design 61IP), and in 1997, for John Mathews with a perfin PC/NZA for the Perfin Club of New Zealand and Australia. So, in 2007 I wrote to Chainstream Ltd., with an address in Carshalton, Surrey as they had made those two machines. I got no reply nor were telephone calls answered.

Following many enquiries and Internet searches, it was not until August 11, 2008, following a phone call, that I wrote Chainstream UK Ltd., 196 Morland Road, Croydon CR0 6NF (0208 686 6500), who denied any connection with the other company. The purpose of my letter was to obtain a quotation for my design using their FD3 machine that has a base area of 5¾ x 2½ (146.1 mm x 63.5 mm) and weighs 2¾ pounds (1.24 kg) and would be predominately aluminum. I also asked to be advised the cost of posting and packing together with an expected delivery date after payment. This letter was never

answered, but after several more abortive phone calls I eventually spoke to a Mr. Judge who quoted a price of £285 for such a design.

A check for the agreed amount was sent on September 11. At the same time I asked that posting of the machine be delayed until October 10 due to a vacation in the USA. The check was cleared through my bank on October 1. As nothing more happened, I phoned on November 11 and was informed that posting would be the next day, but it never arrived.

Several more phone calls were made, but no contact was made until January 23, 2009, when I was told that delivery would be made on January 26 or 27. On February 10, I was told it would be sent by carrier TNT, but it still did not arrive. On February 25, a new machine would be personally delivered in seven days. Subsequently, personal delivery was promised by March 6, April 7, and finally my money would be returned if it were not supplied by April 17. On April 22 and May 7, I was informed that the check was to be posted the next day!

Finally, on May 8, I was told that the check had been posted the previous day by Recorded Delivery. On May 9, the check arrived, but it had been sent by first class ordinary post and postmarked the previous day. There was no letter or apology, but at least the check did not bounce!

Romanian Perfins Website

For those of you who collect or are interested in Romanian perfins, the editor has been directed to the following website, www.romaniastamps.com, that is dedicated to Romanian stamps. Perfins are under the "Specialties" tab. There you will find a catalog of Romanian perfins, authored by Lazlo Eros and Dr. Tam Llewllyn-Edwards, that you may download and print.

This catalog is based on Eros's 1989 Catalog of

Romanian Perfins, Bob Schwerdt's 1991 Supplement, and additional images provided by Tam Llewellyn, eBay, and from Eros's collection. This new catalog includes the user (where known), a period of usage, and a rarity factor for each perfin. There are also several interesting articles on Romanian perfins, including an update of David Began (#3659) & Dick Scheper's (#3311) October 2006 Bulletin article on Bogus Romanian perfins (60:169-173).

My Favorite Perfins – Part VI

I began a discussion of favorite and most unusual U.S. perfins in the September/October 2008 Bulletin (62:158-160), with a promise of more to come. In this issue, I present the part of the display presented at the St. Louis convention related to early imperforate stamps.

This exhibit page was assembled from several

collections. Various perfins are shown here on early imperforate stamp issues, not often seen with perfins. Note the second example also includes a precancel.

Additional User – Pattern R66.5

While going through my perfin covers a few months ago, I found a rather non-descript cover with "The R.G. Chase Company, Geneva, NY" corner card. (See Figure 1) The cover is franked with a 2-cent 1914 issue and was posted July 16, 1916. Initially, I thought the perfin was pattern R66 (RG/C), a "B" rated perfin. The R.G. Chase Company, New York, NY is shown as the verified user for R66 in the current Catalog of United States Perfins and Geneva, NY was added as an alternative location in Additions & Corrections #1.



However, upon closer inspection of the cover, I discovered the perfin appears to be pattern R66.5 (RG/C), also a "B" rated perfin, whose verified user is The Chase Nurseries, Geneva, NY. The R.G. Chase Company is not listed in the U.S. Catalog or its two Additions & Corrections as an alternate user for R66.5. So, it seemed as if I have found a new, alternate user for R66.5. I sent a scan of the cover to Brad Baker, U.S. Catalog Chairman. Brad

confirmed my identification and will include this new information in the next Additions & Corrections.

A few days later, I discovered that I have a "fancy, advertizing" perfin cover with a "The Chase Nurseries, Geneva, NY" corner card. The perfin on this cover is also pattern R66.5. This additional cover is shown in Figure 2.



An Internet search yielded an 1893 History of Geneva, NY (history.rays-place.com/ny/geneva-9) which lists R.G. Chase & Co. as one of the major nurseries in the Geneva, NY area. This history also indicates the company may have been in existence before 1870 and it was still in business in 1893. From this background, it seems probable that both The R.G. Chase Company and The Chase Nurseries were the same company that used different names on their correspondence to be more descriptive of their business.


Perfins on Imperforate Stamps







User of Pattern S171.5 Identified


I recently obtained a New Year's greeting postcard with pattern S171.5 (SL/Co). The "A" rated perfin is in the 1-cent Benjamin Franklin issue of the 1902 series. This previously unidentified pattern was mailed in New York City on December, 29, 1908, by J. L. Mooney of the S. Langsdorf & Co. doing business at the corner of Spring and Crosby Streets,

New York, NY. Brad Baker, U.S. Catalog Chairman has confirmed my identification and will include this new information in the U.S. Catalog's next Additions & Corrections.

A search of the World Wide Web shows that S. Langsdorf & Co. were publishers of picture postcards on a very wide range of subjects starting in the early 1900's. (It appears they are not in business today.) Their cards are highly prized by postcard collectors, with many of them listed in the popular Internet auctions.

- U.S. Pattern W171 March 2008 (62:42-46)





New U.S. Pattern O78.5. Note: New control pin above "I" Preliminary Rating: "A"







The Perfins of Mexico

This is the fourth article in a series discussing my work in updating the America's portion of the *World Perfins Catalog*.

This time we are starting to look at the perfins of Mexico. This current article will discuss the Postal and Revenue patterns. The Officials and Punches will be discussed in a subsequent article due to space limitations.

You will note that I have added a few new patterns to Mexico (A17.5, A24, A25 and B34.5). I doubt that these will be the last additions. Hopefully this

will encourage our Latin American neighbors to add to the list.


The "A" prefixes are for perfins in Postal issues and the "B's" are for Revenues. The Revenue patterns have been broken out into two categories. First, we cover the normal revenue usages. The second part deals with the usage of perfins on "Customs" (Aduanas) revenues which were used at all of the Ports of Entry into Mexico. This last area is very likely to expand somewhat as more information surfaces.

This article discusses perfins used in the 1923 German "hyperinflation" stamps. Several covers are shown, including one that required two blocks of 10 stamps.

The second is in the March 2009 issue of *The China Clipper* (73:97). Part of the article that discusses the

Hong Kong Post and illustrates a perfinned stamp. The text states that this (stamp) "bears silent witness to the commercial activity of the taipans" (in Hong Kong). [Editor's note: Webster states that a "taipan" is a foreigner living in China that wields economic power.]

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
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
Another "Holey" Stamp

"Perfin Oddities" Presidents Washington & Harding

Before you read this you may consider that any article comparing President Washington to President Harding in any manner would certainly be considered strange indeed! But I will not try to do that. I will try to compare President Washington with President Harding - that is as these two perfins are concerned.

Any collector looking at the perfins below will immediately be struck by the odd shape of the letter "O" and number "8". Looking in the Catalog of United States Perfins is no help because neither appears in the catalog in this form. Without the stamps in hand it might take quite a while to understand what these perfins are. However, since I have the stamps in hand, I am at an advantage.





This is really Pattern P55

A close inspection shows that somehow both of these perfins came to be because there was a fold in the stamp at the time they were perfinned. The Washington stamp is pattern P55, Parke, Davis & Company and is a "preper" from Detroit MI. The Harding stamp is pattern I16, Irving Berlin Incorporated. So, when folded, the "PO" magically becomes "PD" and the "I8" becomes "IB".

If you have some unidentified or funny looking perfins, look for a paper crease and you may discover what you really have! Oh, by the way, the editor would really like to see any other examples that you may find.
