## Another Successful Convention!

### The Perfins Club 2017 Annual Business Meeting Minutes

August 10, 2017

#### Call to Order

The meeting was called to order at 1 p.m. by President Steve Endicott. A quorum was present consisting of all the members of the Executive Board. Steve thanked all for coming. He then asked for self introductions of the members present. Members introduced themselves by name, state of residence and collecting interests.

The minutes of 2016 annual meeting were unanimously approved as published in the September/October, 2016, issue of *The Perfins Bulletin*.

#### Officer and Committee Chair Reports

##### Treasurer's Report Dan Baugher

The total financial assets as of Dec 30 2016 for the Club were \$111,261, down 3% from Dec 2015. The catalog sales, auctions and cover sales all reported increases this year. *Bulletin* expenses were higher this year because 7 issues were paid for in 2016 (normally 6). The Club was able to purchase postage for 2017 at a significant discount.

##### *The Perfins Bulletin* Paul Mistretta

During the past year six 20-page issues of the *Bulletin* were published.

The good news is that, at the present time, there is material in the queue for several future issues, thanks in no small part to **Curt McCoy** whose reports of the data collected during the 2014 census of perfins in the Schermack coils (reprinted with permission from the *US Specialist*) will be an ongoing feature through completion. In addition, several other members are regular contributors. In fear of missing someone, I will not even attempt to name these frequent contributors individually. Just a great big thank you for your input. Best of all is that the subject matter has been varied, keeping the fun in editing (and I hope in reading) the submitted material.

A second individual thank you goes to **Joe Chinnici** who assumed the role of Assistant Editor of the *Bulletin* this year. His review of "ready to publish" material has significantly reduced the problems I invariably introduce into materials as I prepare them for publication.

The only bad news is that the temporary surplus of articles can evaporate in a very short time if we become complacent. So, keep the articles and suggestions coming!

And a very brief note of a personal milestone: With the publication of the July-August newsletter I have now edited 110 issues of the *Bulletin*, making me the third most published

The Perfins Club hosted a Society Booth at the two major APS sponsored stamp shows in 2017; AmeriStamp Expo 2017, March 3-5, 2017, in Reno, NV, and StampShow 2017, August 3-6, 2017, in Richmond, VA. There continues to be a significant interest in perfins from those attending these shows, resulting in steady to very brisk activity during the show hours. At our booth, we had serious and lengthy discussions with over 25 people at Reno and 45 at Richmond. At least twice that number stopped with a quick question. ### 2017 U.S. Rev-Perfins Report Art Mongan

I'm planning to have my working copy of the Rev-Perfins Handbook at the NAPEX stamp show revenue societies table next Spring. If possible I would like to have flyers at the table offering ARA & SRS members opportunities to purchase the handbook .

There have been very few new patterns for transactional revenues (Volume 1), several new patterns for commodity revenues (Volume 2), and a larger number for Checks and Fiscal Documents (Volume 3).

Current plans are to establish a "drop dead" file same as required for many industrial research projects. Also the possibility of migrating the handbook from File Maker Pro to either Excel, InDesign or Word is under consideration.

I am pleased to announce that the Perfins Club is the official sponsor of the 2018 national convention to be held in Columbus, OH. This will be in celebration of the 75th anniversary of our Club. ### Dues Structure Ken Masters

Club costs related to *The Perfins Bulletin (TPB)* are in two areas; cost of publishing which we control and cost of postage which we do NOT control (i.e. mailing to Europe is \$4.16/issue). In recognition of these facts the Executive Board approved separating dues and postage as follows: effective 7/1/18, dues for everyone in the world will be US\$15/yr. At the same time members outside of the U.S. will be given the option of receiving an electronic version of *TPB* at no additional cost or of continuing to receive a paper copy by paying a surcharge equivalent to the actual cost of mailing to their location. There is NO change for Life Members and no change for U. S. members.

### Library

Our library has been moved to the American Philatelic Research Library (APRL). *Doug Cutler* has relocated to smaller apartment. Ken Masters drove and Steve Endicott flew to San Diego where they boxed up the library and sent it to APRL.

Jerry Hejduk described the new APRL library and how for \$1,000 we now have a permanent plaque at the end of the aisle that houses our library. He described it as "forever advertising."

Doug was thanked for his many years of effort with the library.

*Clark Bucchi* has volunteered to guide members on how to access our materials at the APRL, plus keep track of when new country catalogs come out.

### Historian

*Diane Eastman* has volunteered to be our first official Club Historian having the primary responsibility to record Club photographs and other interesting historical information about our Club.

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## Elections

**Bob Hodges** was nominated to serve as Director-at-Large, assuming the seat currently held by Doug Turner. As required in our By-laws, Doug is retiring after two consecutive terms as Director. We thanked Doug for his service. Having no opposition, Bob Hodges was unanimously elected as Director-at-Large effective January 1, 2018.

**Steve Endicott** and **Bob Szymanski** have been nominated for the position of President of the Club. According to the By-laws of the Club, a general election will be held to fill the position; ballots will be provided to the membership in the September/October issue of the *Bulletin*, with instructions concerning submission and timing of these ballots.

### Floyd Walker Memorial Award

A list of members who past away this year was read and a moment of silence was observed for them.

The meeting was adjourned at 1:58pm. Forty five members attended the convention; two new members were signed up and one former member returned.

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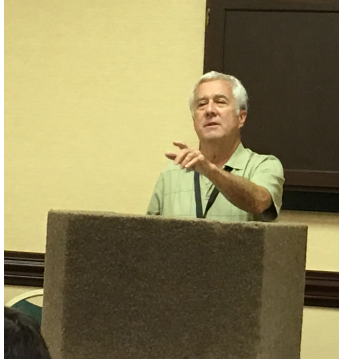
## Another Bosnian Newspaper Stamp Used In Yugoslavia

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## Memories of Convention 74 - Louisville Kentucky

I cannot emphasize the importance of the annual Perfins Club Convention. This year's convention, held in Louisville, KY, proved to be a treasure trove of great perfin material, perfin information and good times to be had with fellow perfin collectors. All nine members of the Board of Directors were present and several perfin sellers had tables at the show.

The convention opens to the "early birds" on Monday and closes in the afternoon on Saturday with the convention banquet Saturday evening. The Perfins Club and Precancel Stamp Society meet jointly, with the PSS typically arranging the convention location and hotel. Although open to anyone, the convention is not advertised in the main philatelic media, thus providing a

family atmosphere for the dealers and attendees. This atmosphere lends itself to the time one must spend to go through the stock of the dealers to find what you need. These days, a proliferation of tablets are seen, as many collectors have their inventory lists digitized, and there is plenty of space in the open area and at the dealers' tables for working through their stock. Probably the thing that I find most amazing is the trust between the dealers and collectors at the convention. With the convention held at the show hotel, dealers will often allow collectors to take material to their rooms or to the open table area outside of the main convention hall. This is not something I have seen elsewhere at other shows.

The depth of the material that is present at these conventions is amazing. Unless your collection is very advanced, you will find perfins you need

and will be able to fill holes. You will make a connection with the dealers present and can leave them with a list of material you might like

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and if they run across your needs at other shows, will give you a follow-up email / call to see if you still desire it. There was probably several hundred years of perfin collecting knowledge at the convention and that can be exploited by the collector. From seeing how others maintain their digital files to straight forward questions/ answers from these long-time collectors/dealers, you are sure to advance your perfin knowledge.

I illustrate a few of my “finds” to show off and demonstrate the kind of material that can be

found at the convention.

On the previous page (Fig 1) is a simple prepaid return envelope to the International Harvester Company office in Fresno CA. It is pattern **I43.7A-20**. Although San Francisco and Oakland CA are known to have used this pattern, Fresno is not. It is not exactly rare, but an unknown office none-the-less.

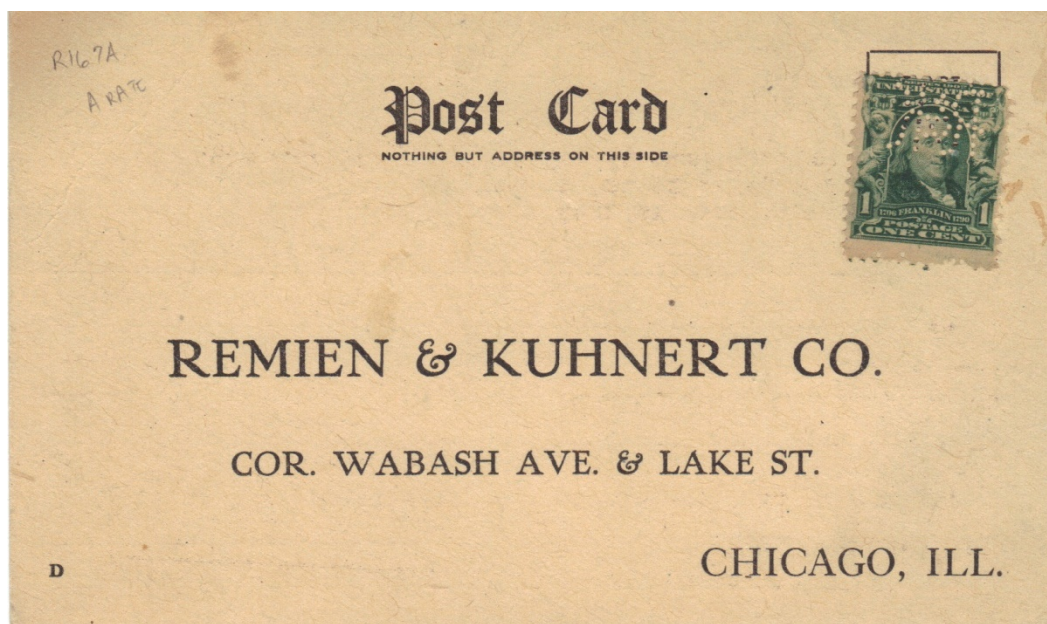


Fig. 2. Remien & Kuhnert Co. unused prepaid reply post card franked with a stamp perfined with pattern **R167A**.

This post card (Fig. 2) is rare as it is an example of pattern **R167A** (R&K). I snagged this rare

perfin from one of the dealers at the convention and even called Steve Endicott, our US Catalog Editor (and President), over to verify it was the A rated pattern. Steve was kind enough to oblige and a few minutes later, I had filled another hole in my collection.

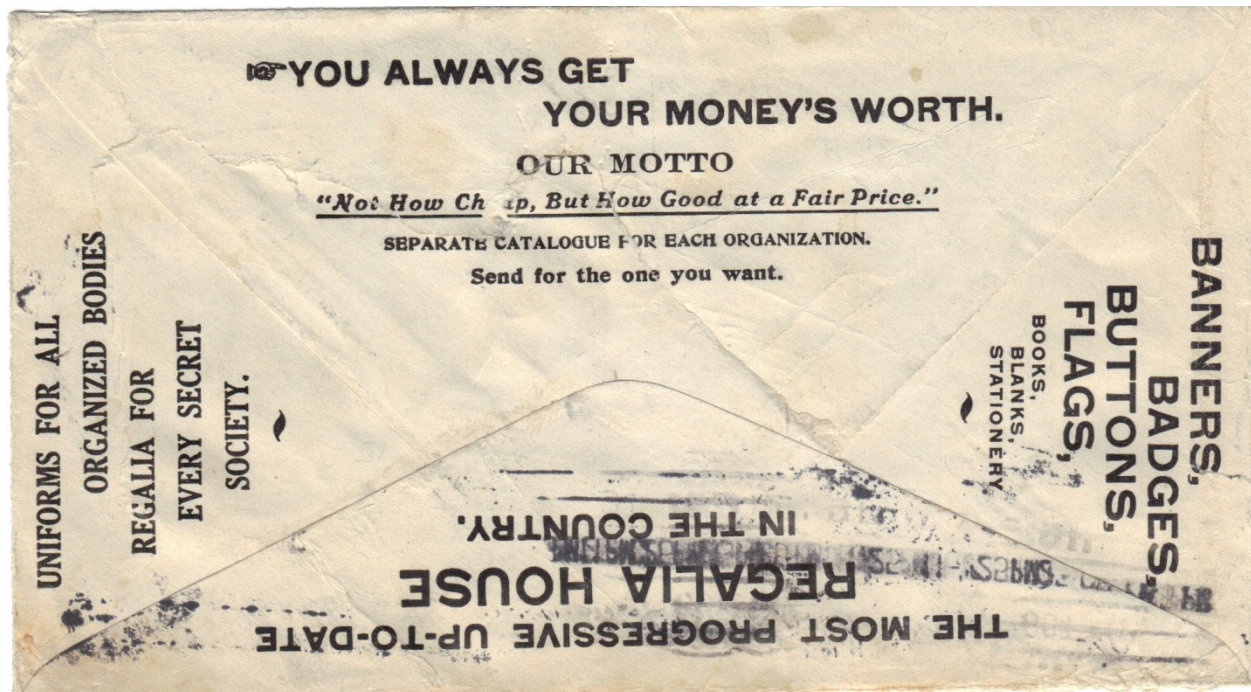


Fig. 3. Front and back of an attractive Henderson-Ames Company cover franked with a stamp perfined with pattern H14

My last example (Fig 3; next page) is an advertising cover with pattern **H14**. Nothing new here for the knowledge files but the cover is sure a pretty example with advertising front and

back. I picked up more than two dozen advertising covers and cards at the convention like this one and they hold a place of honor in my collection. Seeing this cover, it is obvious that Henderson-Ames Company of Kalamazoo MI specialized in manufacturing uniforms, other regalia and furnishings for various Lodges & Societies.

In terms of loose perfin stamps, I acquired more than 6,000 with the majority being in the C – C+



rarity range. As a general worldwide perfin collector, several thousand additions were made to my US and Worldwide collections. Next year is the 75<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the Perfins Club – I urge you to take advantage of this valuable

resource and attend the convention. I think you will be surprised at the welcome you receive and the material you can find for your collection. I look forward to seeing you there!

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## Errata

Noted by Steve Endicott: It has come to our attention that there are two typographical errors in the financial report for 2016 as published in the March-April 2017 issue of *The Bulletin*. Specifically, the income number for the Approvals line somehow incorrectly included the number "1" (as in "7312"). The number should have been "732". Secondly, in the Assets category, the amount in CDs is "\$71,519", not "\$75,250" as was published.

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## Schermack Mailing Machine Involved in Mail Fraud??

In George Howard's 1943 book, *The Stamp Machines and Coiled Stamps*, he listed the user of Schermack control pattern **13579** as unknown. In a 1945 article in *The Bureau Specialist*, also by Howard, the user was identified as the Julian Hawthorne Company.

As I wrote the Schermack discovery article reprinted in the *Bulletin* (Sept-Oct 2017), I couldn't help but

realize how little we actually knew about Julian Hawthorne as a Schermack control perfin user.

Control pattern **13579** was the most reported pattern in the 2013 Schermack Control Perfin Census, and was featured in a six article series in *The Specialist* in 2014. Of the 252 stamps with control pattern **13579** reported in that census, only 6 were still found on cover.



Developing a ratio of "stamp on cover" compared to single stamp reported, by control pattern, most Schermack control perfin users came in between 11% and 19%, still on cover. Pattern **13579** had a ratio of only 2%! Way, way below any reasonable expectation. Something surely was amiss? I'll share my theory why, later in this article.

Athol Glass wrote a series of articles for *The Specialist* in the late 1990s highlighting the companies that used Schermack Control perfins. No article appeared on Julian Hawthorne Company. Glass did not have a Hawthorne cover in his extensive collection. In fact Hawthorne covers are missing from nearly all collections, while used stamps with control pattern **13579** are in every collection.

Julian Hawthorne (1846-1934) was a unique individual. He was the only son of the famous 19th century novelist Nathaniel Hawthorne. After several failed educational pursuits and despite the family wishes, Julian, like his father, became an author and early on showed great promise. The family name easily opened many doors for young Hawthorne, but with that came very high expectations. He had a flair for writing. His writing was not so much an art form, but more a way to earn a living. He was accustomed to a certain lifestyle that required money.

He wrote everything from novels to poetry to ad copy. Over his lifetime, he probably turned out 10 times the volume of the written word as his father. Early in his career he concentrated on novels but they generated an uneven cash flow at best. Prior to the turn of the century he turned away from novels.

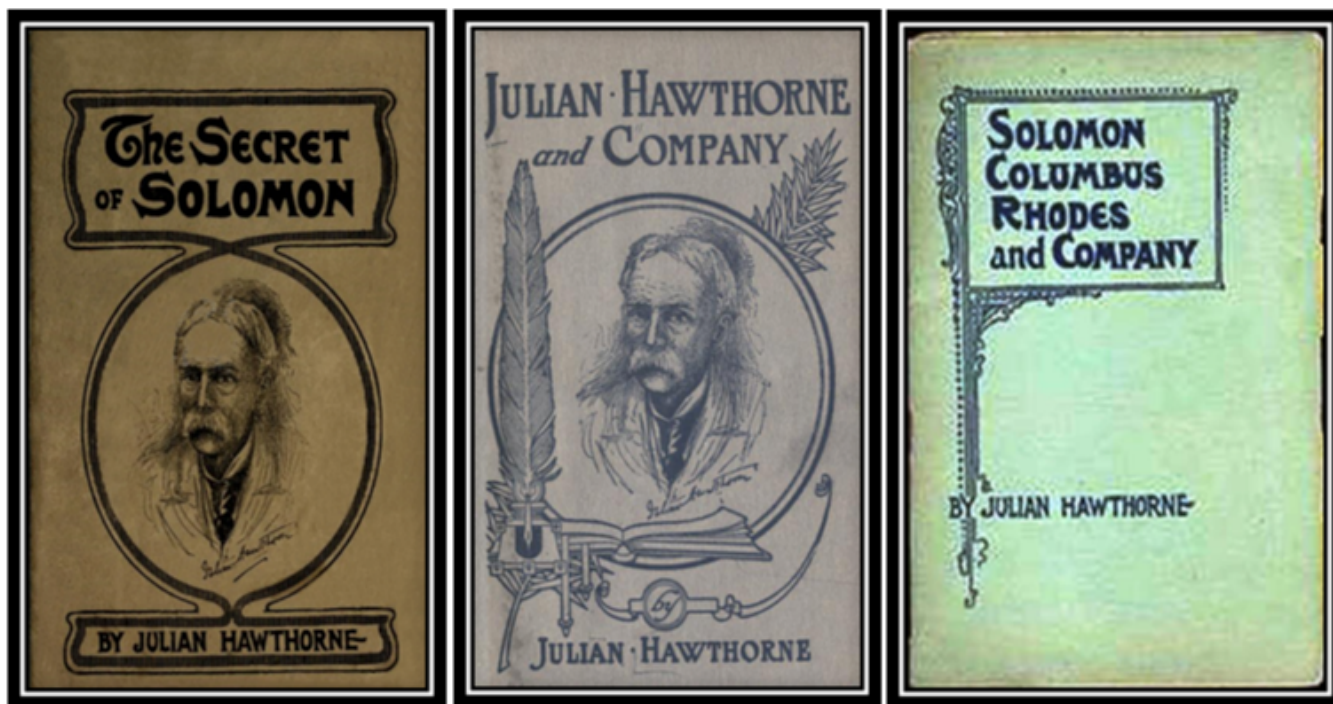


There were still bills to be paid. Hawthorne put his skills to use in more commercial pursuits. He began freelance writing. He wrote articles for both newspapers and magazines. He wrote for *Cosmopolitan Magazine* and a series for *Review of Reviews*. Both companies are known as early Schermack users in New York. Perhaps that is where he became familiar with the Schermack Mailing Machine. The Julian Hawthorne Company was capitalized in New York for \$100,000. So why in 1910 would this individual find it necessary to own a high volume mailing machine capable of processing 250 envelopes a minute?

In 1908 a former Harvard classmate, Dr. William J. Morton, convinced Julian to become a partner in a Canadian silver mining venture. After starting several smaller mining companies, in late 1909 they took advantage of the family's good name and

created the Hawthorne Silver & Iron Mines LTD. The company was capitalized in Delaware for \$15,000,000. They set about selling company stock. Stock was offered at \$1 per share with a minimum buy of \$300.

Besides lending his name, Hawthorne was also the company's lead pitchman. He wrote several short stories and pamphlets, loosely disguised as literature, promoting the venture. Short stories of note were *The Secret Of Solomon*, *Julian Hawthorne and Company* and *Solomon Columbus Rhodes and Company*. We have Schermack control perfin covers with *The Secret Of Solomon* in the upper left corner of the envelope. I suspect the same is true for *Julian Hawthorne and Company*. A partial cover bearing *Solomon, Columbus, Rhodes and Company* is known. The Rhodes he mentioned was the diamond tycoon Cecil Rhodes of South Africa. Hawthorne's control pattern **13579** resembles a diamond. Coincidence, I think not.



These, soft cover 5 x 7 publications, were sent "compliments of the author" in 5.5 x 7.5 envelopes to a rather large mailing list of friends, associates and interested parties. The stories all had a common theme. A man has to be willing to take a risk to find his own financial security. Not a risk like the roll of the dice or the turn of a card. Rather an educated

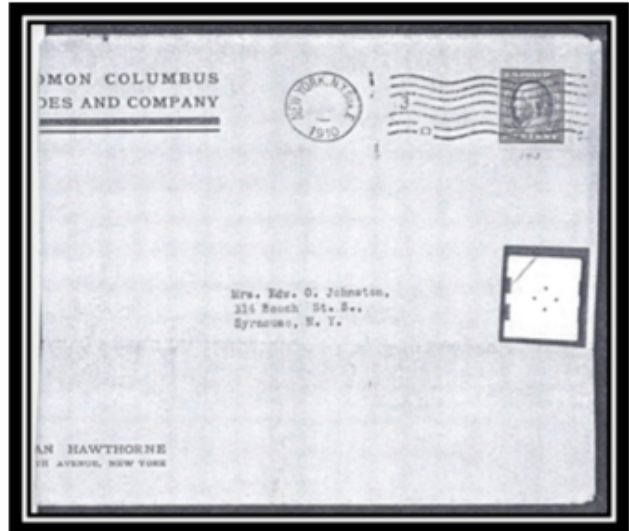
risk, guided by trusted friends. Here are some final excerpts from *Julian Hawthorne and Company*.

- "We are in no hurry to make swollen fortunes for ourselves.
- But we are in a position to make immense profits for many thousands of people, at a cost to them practically nominal; and, as you

will see in a moment, we are taking very effective measures to accomplish just that thing.

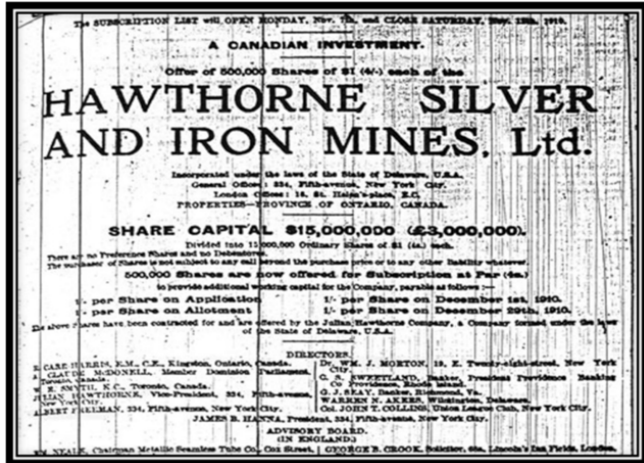
- It is on the next page...

- In a day or two you will find in your mailbox the document outlining these reports; and if you have faith in the goddess Opportunity, you will be careful not to let the document get into the waste-paper basket."



As you can see, the "complimentary short story" was quickly followed up by glowing promotional

pamphlets, endorsements and the company's stock prospectus.



Hawthorne's flamboyant writing style often made statements, not based in fact. He was called out several times on his assertions. *Canadian Mining Journal* April 15, 1909 referred to Julian as "a sublimated ass" and again in Sept 1, 1910 "the mines were as worthless as Confederate paper money". Yet other newspapers and journals were less scrupulous, for the right price, they printed the company's lofty claims.

It is reported that Hawthorne Silver & Iron Mines Ltd. and the several lesser companies generated between \$3 and \$4,000,000 from the sale of their company stock. That would equate to just shy of \$100,000,000 today. No dividends were ever paid and some of the shareholders started getting restless.

Federal prosecutors convened a Grand Jury on Sept 1 1911 to consider indictments. Hawthorne Silver and Iron Mines Ltd. immediately suspended

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operations and halted the mailing of the company's | promotional circulars.

### SUSPICION OF ACCESSORY TO COMMIT MAIL FRAUD

A trial began 11/25/1912. Five defendants were charged with the fraudulent use of the mails. *The Cornell Daily Sun* reported on Dec 13, 1912 that the full text of *The Secret of Solomon*, one of the most important documents among the circulars, letters and other literature issued by Julian Hawthorne, was read to the jury. Over 100 witnesses came forward for the prosecution during the trial, only 6 on behalf of the defense. Julian Hawthorne did not take the stand.

This was a very high profile case. Prosecution took 70 court days, 4 calendar months, and cost the Federal government \$70,000. There were 8000 pages of testimony recorded. Ten thousand documents were placed into court records as evidence, the total weight of that paper alone was nearly one ton! It was the second longest trial in New York Federal Court history, as of that date.

How many of the Julian Hawthorne circular mailers were in that lot? No wonder they are so scarce. If they were ever released, they probably went to a charitable group. There the stamps were soaked off cover, and sold as kiloware. This could certainly explain the scarcity of pattern **13579** on cover, when compared to the commonality of a single used stamp.

A Guilty verdict was rendered March 15, 1913. Hawthorne and Morton each were convicted on 17 counts and sentenced to 1 year and 1 day in the

Atlanta Federal Penitentiary. Even upon his release he still professed his innocence, but then that isn't so unusual.

So if you have a Schermack stamp with control pattern **13579** in your collection or have the opportunity to acquire one, I hope you will look at it a little differently from now on. That control pattern **13579** serves as the stamp's fingerprint. Evidence that it was part of a mining swindle and a co-conspirator in a mail fraud perpetrated in the early 1900s.

Collectors looking for a new area to collect should consider Schermack control perfin stamps and covers. It's a small enough niche of philately to get your arms around. Plus, new items are still being uncovered 100 years after their usage, perhaps a dozen or so in the last 5 years alone. What other area of stamp collecting offers that kind of opportunity for discovery?

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# A Territory of Hawaii T47 Perfin Stamp used as Payment for Postage Due

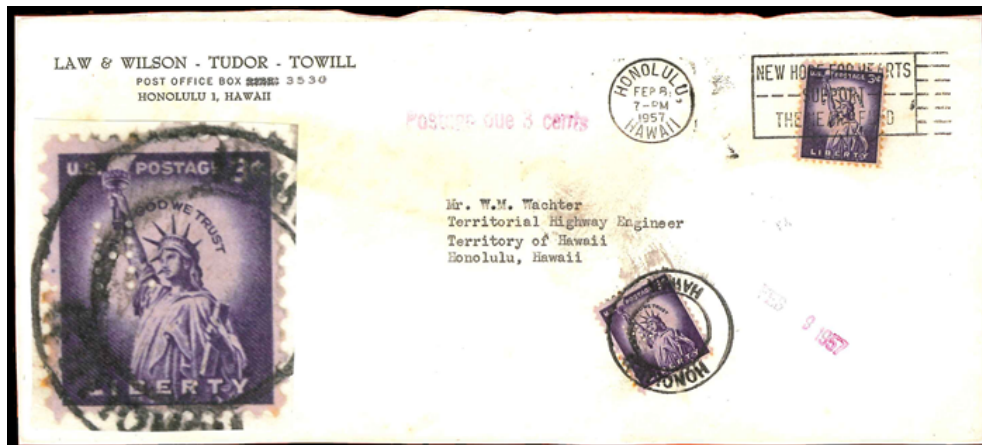


Figure 1. Three cent Liberty stamp with a T47 perfin as postage due on a 1957 cover delivered to a Territory of Hawaii governmental office.

This is a report of a single cover with a Territory of Hawaii T47 perfin stamp used in a novel way. In Figure 1 a 3c Statue of Liberty stamp (Scott #1035) with a partial T47 perfin (T.H.) was affixed as payment for postage due. The envelope was mailed with an incomplete address yet arrived at its correct destination. Had it been

properly addressed, it would have read: W. M. Wachter, Superintendent of Public Works and Territorial Highway Engineer, Territorial Department of Public Works, etc. according to his mailing address on contemporary covers in my collection.

The details of the complete address and an appropriately tied perfin stamp may help to give *The Perfins Bulletin* reader insight that Mr. Wachter was located at one of last few departments that continued to use the T-47 perfin long after it was replaced by metered postage in 1954<sup>1</sup>. In a different circumstance that involved a stamp with a Northern Pacific Railroad perfin which paid for postage due on a returned letter, there was no connection between the user of the perfin, a railway, and the return address, a Freemason lodge.<sup>2</sup>

Except for the perfin and the partial address, the remainder of the cover was commonplace. It was a business size letter franked with a normal 3c Liberty and tied with a machine slogan cancel dated February 8, 1957, Honolulu, Hawaii. The letter was overweight for the 3c rate and

received an auxiliary marking stating the makeup payment: “Postage due 3 cents”. The insufficient postage was satisfied with a 3c Liberty stamp with perfin from the receiving entity which was canceled with a hand device (Figure 1). The perfin was partial and lacked most of the “T.” perforations but had all of the “H.” perforations (Figure 1, inset). I examined thirty-five used examples of the 3c Liberty with the T47 perfin in my collection which showed that the extent of the partial perfin on the cover made it an outlier since I found only a single identical example.

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## Jamaica - Unlisted Pattern - 2<sup>nd</sup> West Indian Army Regiment

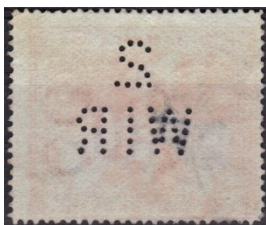

Here's another strange one for you. I have had this perfin in my Jamaican perfins for quite some time and honestly have no idea where I got it. It is not listed in The World Perfins Catalog, American Section, published by the Perfins Club in 1992. It is, however, listed under Sierra Leone in The World Perfins Catalog, African Section, published by the Perfins Club in 1995.

The West India Regiments (WIR) were infantry units of the British Army recruited from and normally stationed in the British colonies of the Caribbean between 1795 and 1927. In 1888, the two West India Regiments then in existence were reduced to a single unit of two battalions. This regiment differed from similar forces raised in other parts of the British Empire in that it formed an integral part of the regular British Army. In 1958, a new regiment was created following the creation of the Federation of the West Indies with the establishment of three battalions. However, the regiment's existence was short-lived and it was disbanded in 1962, when its personnel were used to establish other units in Jamaica and Trinidad and Tobago. Throughout their history, the regiments were involved in a number of campaigns in the West Indies and Africa, and also took part in the First World War, where they served in the Middle East and East Africa.

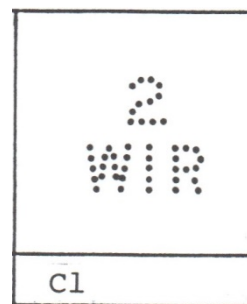
Eight West India Regiments were commissioned between 24 April and 1 September 1795. The original intention was both to recruit free blacks from the West Indian population and to purchase slaves from the West Indian plantations. In 1807, all serving black soldiers recruited as



slaves in the West India Regiments of the British Army were freed under the Mutiny Act passed by the British parliament that same year. In 1808, the Abolition Act caused all trading in slaves to be "utterly abolished, prohibited and declared to be unlawful". In 1812, a West African recruiting depot was established on Bance Island in Sierra Leone to train West African volunteers for the West India Regiments. By 1816, the end of the Napoleonic Wars and the reduction of the West India regiments to six led to the closure of this depot. Thereafter all recruitment for the various West Indian regiments that fought in World War I and World War II were West Indian volunteers, with officers and some senior NCOs coming from Britain.

The WIR soldiers became a valued part of the British forces garrisoning the West Indies, where losses from disease and climate were heavy amongst white troops. The black Caribbean soldiers by contrast, proved better adapted to tropical service. They served against locally recruited French units that had been formed for the same reasons. Free black Caribbean soldiers played a prominent and often distinguished role in the military history of Latin America and the Caribbean.

Under **Sierra Leone** the perfin is pattern number **C1** with a user ID of Second West Indian Army Regiment based out of Freetown. The stamp is Scott number 31, issued by Jamaica on 1 May 1900. With the 1<sup>st</sup> and 2<sup>nd</sup> West India Regiments merging into one unit, it seems that this perforator should have existed prior to that date. I would also make the guess, that it found its way home to Jamaica after service in Africa in the 1900 timeframe.
